THE BENEFITS OF HIGH SCHOOL AND YOUTH SPORTS

Everybody knows that regular physical activity helps contribute to healthier, longer lives. But, did you know that involvement in high school sports delivers a wide array of non-physical benefits as well?

BETTER GRADES

For starters, high school students who participate in sports are far less likely to drop out of school. In fact, participation in high school sports actually has been shown to deliver consistently higher grades.

BETTER LIFE SKILLS

People who played competitive sports in high school demonstrate more confidence, leadership, and self-respect. They are better at setting goals and managing their time and they have a better appreciation for diversity and a more developed sense of morality. High school sports participation can also make a difference in earning power. People who played competitive sports in their youth tend to earn significantly higher incomes than those who did not.

GREATER WELL-BEING

Student athletes manifest stronger peer relationships, higher self-esteem, a closer sense of family and participate more in volunteerism. They are also less likely to engage in high risk behavior. They have a greater sense of initiative, persistence and personal responsibility. A survey of more than 14,000 teens found that those who participated in team sports were less likely to use drugs, smoke cigarettes and carry weapons.

BETTER HEALTH OUTCOMES

Participation in youth sports and other physical activities is a lead indicator in improved health and fitness. It's little wonder why the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends that children ages six to 17 participate in one hour of physical activity daily.



On January 20, we celebrated Martin Luther King, Jr. Day. First graders learned about why MLK was an important figure in history. Students listened to the chapter book, Martin Luther




King, Jr., and the pop-up picture book, **Martin Luther King, Jr.: An Adventure in Courage**. First graders also read a Weekly Reader article and watched a short clip of MLK's I have a Dream speech. Students completed the history study by making a poster that answers why Martin Luther King was a hero. Jasmine (daughter of Monica and Dennis Dau) explained he was a hero because, "He stopped segregation. That is separation of people by black and white."

Olivia (daughter of Stephanie and Josh Arnzen) shared a moment that stood out for her. "When Martin was in Kindergarten, his best friend was white and Martin was brown. He was told by his friend's father that he could not play with his friend. That was so sad. I felt like I was going to cry because they can't play together. It makes my eyebrows go down."
