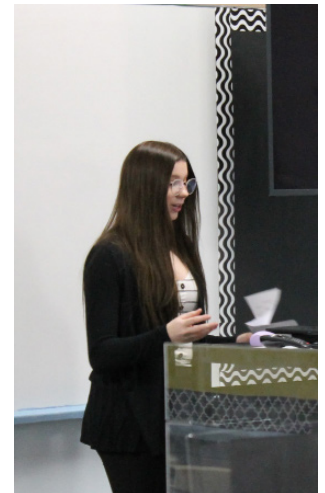

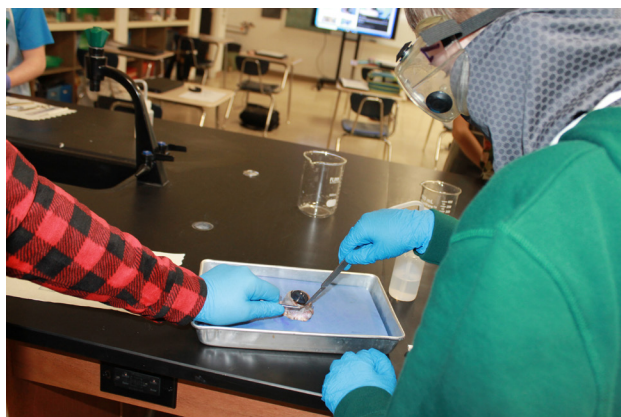
What advice would you give younger athletes?
